Course Learning Outcomes	 By the end of this course, students will be able to: Identify and analyze major movements in contemporary art (e.g., Abstract Expressionism, Minimalism, Conceptual Art, Postmodernism, etc.). Understand and articulate key theoretical concepts in contemporary art such as appropriation, deconstruction, and institutional critique. Critically evaluate the role of social, political, and technological factors in shaping contemporary art practices. Discuss the impact of global art markets and museums on the production and reception of contemporary art. Develop a personal, well-informed perspective on the role of contemporary art in society. Create an informed and analytical art review or essay based on contemporary artworks.
Course Content	This course is designed to introduce students to the diverse landscape of contemporary art, encompassing its history, key movements, influential artists and theoretical frameworks. We will explore the evolution of art from the mid- 20th century to the present day, examining how contemporary art challenges traditional boundaries and reflects social, political and technological shifts. Students will critically engage with the artworks, the contexts in which they were created and the impact they have on global culture and society. By the end of the course, students should have a comprehensive understanding of contemporary art's role in shaping modern visual culture.
